**WILL OF INVENTOR
AUDLEY IS FILED**

**NEW YORK MAN WAS FATHER OF
BERTRAM A. AUDLEY OF THIS
CITY**

The will of Francis H. Audley—deceased father of Bertram A. Audley, of No. 186 Hawley street was filed for probate in New York today in the Surrogates' Court and directs his estate of "over \$2,000" in personal property, after all debts are paid, to be distributed, as follows:

Catherine W. Audley, his widow, of No. 39 Hourahan street, Stamford, Conn. the letters patent No. 12,852—1907—known as an "Improvement in Whips" which were issued on June 3, 1907 for Great Britain.

Robert Audley, son, of No. 2,095 Webster avenue, New York, one-half interest in letters patent No. 3,568—1908—known as an "Improvement in Revolver Holsters," which were issued on February 17, 1908, for the kingdom of Great Britain.

Robert Audley, son, of No. 2,095 Webster avenue, New York, one-half interest in letters patent No. 3,568—1908—known as an "Improvement in Revolver Holsters," which were issued on February 17, 1908, for the kingdom of Great Britain.

The rest of the estate to Francis J. Audley, son, of New York, he being named as executor.

Margaret Phoebe, of New York is named as guardian for Robert Audley, during the latter's minority. No provision is made for Bertram, or a daughter, Catherine E. of New York.

Wednesday, June 28th, is the date set, by Surrogate John P. Cohalan, for the proving of the document which, in the presence of John T. Booth of Brooklyn, N. Y., Edward J. Larkin of New York and Lewis V. Hulse of Hoboken, N. J., as attesting witnesses, was executed on February 18, 1909.

Mr. Audley, who was a resident of Stamford, Conn., died at the St. Vincent's Hospital, Seventh avenue and Eleventh street, New York, on May 16th last. He had been in the hospital for about four days suffering from a complication of diseases.

He was sixty-seven years old, conducted a police supply shop at No. 8 Center street, opposite New York Police Headquarters, for about ten years. Formerly he was a harness maker but the development of automobiles made his trade unprofitable. He was the inventor of many appliances used by the police, which included a safety holster.
